

Philippians Study Guide - Philippians 3 (NIV)

Background: Although Paul is writing from house arrest in a private residence, he was chained night and day to a Roman soldier. As discussed in **Philippians 1**, the church of Philippi has “supplied” for Paul’s need (by funds to cover his expenses) so that the cause of Christ would be able to “progress”.

In **Philippians 2**, Paul outlined the humiliation and exaltation of Jesus Christ, relating that with our own earthly walks as His disciples and discussed the role of Timothy and Epaproaditus within the cause of Christ.

As we move into **Philippians 3**, Paul begins reiterating the source of our joy in the midst of uncomfortable circumstances. In the first part of this chapter, Paul will contrast the futility of man’s righteousness versus the sufficiency of God’s righteousness. In the chapter’s latter portion, Paul will invite his readers to follow his example of living above their circumstances and the turmoils around him in view of the prize set before them - being with our Lord Christ Jesus in heaven.

Day 1 (verses 1-3)

 - **Dogs**” - this term signifies false teachers. Dogs, in the day of Paul, were hated creatures and not pets. They were not domestic and many times would attack.
 - **Evil workers**” were those who were part of the religious system. Their works were their salvation in the form of self righteous acts and human effort. Our acts and efforts should naturally stem from our love of God so that others might know Him; not to make us feel better about ourselves.
 - **Mutilation**” comes from “to cut” and “down”. Paul is contrasting the Jewish circumcision in contrast to true spiritual circumcision of the heart. This is also referred to as the “false circumcision” and this term segue into Paul’s definition (verse 3) of what authentic circumcision is in the eyes of God.

Yesterday, Paul warned his fellow believers in the Philippian church about false teachers who worked against the cause of Christ. They were emptying out the work that Jesus did on the cross by requiring areas in order to divide the church. He begins to lay a foundation of why physical circumcision is not a requirement for salvation and that it is only through the work that Jesus Christ did on the cross.

Today, Paul will list why, if physical achievement were required, he could boast more than anyone. After listing those earthly areas, he will show how all are nothing compared to coming to know our Lord Jesus Christ.

Yesterday, Paul, listed his earthly qualifications for “deserving” to be part of the “circumcision”. He referred to this as us putting our “confidence in the flesh”. He states that all of that is nothing compared to being saved in Christ Jesus and none of those earthly achievements could ever earn him salvation. His righteousness, Paul proclaims is a righteousness that comes from Christ on the basis of faith.

Today, Paul will build upon how his desires have matured from the earthly accomplishments to wanting full and complete identification with Christ. This, he teaches his fellow believers, is his ultimate goal.
